Nez Perce Tribe and State of Idaho Sign Title IV-E Agreement

On April 12, 2019, the Nez Perce Tribe (Tribe) hosted a signing event with the State of Idaho; signing an agreement that will grant the Tribe eligibility under the Title IV-E of the social security Act. The event took place at the Tribe's Fisheries Complex in McCall, Idaho. Representatives from the Tribe and the State of Idaho Department of Health and Welfare (State), were in attendance.

Having this agreement with the State is a big step. Both the State and the Tribe are excited to see how they can continue developing a working relationship. The Tribe is currently the only tribe to have a Title IV-E agreement with the State of Idaho.

This project had been underway for a few years. Staff worked diligently to make it happen, and it has taken relentless effort. Overall, the NPT is pleased with the result. "I would like to thank everyone that was involved, no matter at what point you came in," stated Jackie McArthur, Nez Perce Tribe Manager of Social Services.

Title IV-E of the Social Security Act provides funds for states and tribes to provide foster care, transitional independent living programs for children, guardianship assistance, and adoption assistance for children with special needs. Though the State and Tribe will maintain separate sovereigns and respect each other's laws; this agreement sets forth the procedures and protocols for the Tribe to be reimbursed by the federal government for the provision of child welfare services using the systems already established by the State of Idaho.

Nez Perce Tribe Participates in VISTA Project

The Nez Perce Tribe was recently awarded a second AmeriCorps VISTA grant through the Corporation for National Community Service. VISTA members will serve our community while earning a living allowance and also have an option for end-of-service cash stipend or education award. The Nez Perce Tribe was awarded three VISTA members, one VISTA is working as a Grants Management Specialist and one VISTA is working with the Social Services Department I-Vision Youth Program. We have a third slot that is going to be working in another program in the community. We will identify that slot and program later and may be included in a future issues of the Tribal Tribune.

One of the new VISTA Members include Victoria Konen who will be serving as a Grants Management Specialist VISTA Member. She will be stationed in the Finance Department, and working with Anthony Broncheau on grant management system improvements and systems that will help all staff become more efficient, effective and overall better grant writers. First Look Into A Native Owned, Family Businesses









Emmit Carter formally worked with the Nez Perce Tribal Housing Authority as a carpenter and contractor. Emmit is an enrolled member of the Nez Perce tribe. He and his wife Kathy, along with their two children Bryson and Jaclyn Carter, own KC's Burgers and The Tap Room in Lewiston, Idaho as well as the Winchester Kitchen and Bar in Winchester, Idaho.

Emmit and Kathy had originally owned a health food store that started out of their home. This inspiration came from iridology, which is an alternative medicinal technique which studies the patterns, colors, and changing characteristics of the eye's iris, and is examined to determine information about a person's systemic health. Kathy became so fascinated that she began attending seminars, workshops, and bought a book on the subject. Her desire to share iridology with the public led her to opening up the health food store. It later moved to a couple of different locations.

The Carters started the KC's Burgers (KC's) inside the health food store, when they were located in the mall. They eventually sold the health food store and Kathy worked with Happy Day Restaurant for a few years before deciding it was time to start their restaurant back up.

KC's, located on Thain Road, has been running at their current location for the last four years. They offer items such as burgers, bite sized steak, hand dipped chicken tenders; making everything from scratch, where only the tater-tots are frozen. Their signature burgers are numbered, rather than named, so there is no confusion. The quality of food is great, customer service is excellent, and the location is convenient and easy to find.

Kathy had always wanted to own a 'Ma and Pa' restaurant in a small town. When the opportunity arose for KC's to expand, they decided to open the Winchester Kitchen and Bar (Winchester).

In Winchester, they serve the only roasted chicken in town. In addition to the foods served at KC's, they also offer homemade entrees such as soups and corned beef hash. All their breakfast plates are served with fry bread, but Winchester's most popular breakfast is the breakfast sandwich; made up of two pieces of fry bread with ham, bacon, cheese, potatoes and eggs inside, served with syrup.

2019 CRITFC Salmon Camp Accepting Applications Now

The Columbia River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission (CRITFC), in collaboration with the Nez Perce Tribe is hosting Salmon Camp August 11 through August 17, 2019. Incoming 6th-8th grade students from each of the CRITFC Tribes, 5 from each tribe for a total of 20 students, will be selected to attend the free 6-day camp. A stipend will also be provided upon successful program completion.

At Salmon Camp, participants will learn about science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) skills by taking part in culturally relevant, hands-on activities that combine Western science with traditional ecological knowledge. With the assistance of tribal fisheries experts and leaders, the participants will conduct salmon-related field tasks and apply the results to real concerns faced by their communities. The campers also will have opportunities to hear from visiting presenters about their professions and explore various educational and career pathways.

Participants will learn about the science and lifecycle of salmon, see salmon restoration projects, explore Traditional Ecological Knowledge, meet tribal professionals working in the field, gain unique and valuable hands-on experience and more! Applications are due on May 31, 2019. Salmon Camp is held at Camp Wittman on the Nez Perce Reservation, 13 miles South of Lapwai, ID. Chloe Thompson is a Senior at Lapwai High School and an enrolled member of the Nez Perce Tribe. She has always had an interest in fashion and has enjoyed watching America's Next Top Model since it came out. Due to her interest, when Thompson was 16, her mother Diane (Ellenwood) Yellowrobe contacted several Indigenous fashion shows. Thompson was able to travel to various places where she was able to walk for a number of designers such as Designs by Della (Apsaalooke), Red Berry Woman (Hidatsa/Dakota Sioux/Assiniboine), A.L. Couture (Lumbee), Violet Ahmie Designs (Laguna Pueblo), Pam Baker (Kwakiut/Squamish) and OXDX (Jared Yazzie-Navajo).

Thompson's primary strength in modeling is her runway walk. So for her senior project, Thompson chose to host a fashion show. Her senior project made over \$500 and all proceeds were donated to the Lapwai Boys & Girls Club.

Thompson had her mother Diane mentor the project. Although her mother was the mentor, Thompson made all of the calls to get designers, arranged for help with set-up, created the agenda, managed the music, arranged for hair and make-up artists, and of course gave the girls guidance and coaching on how to walk. "Chloe's success was all on her," Yellowrobe said, "I offered advice and realities of what was needed to be done, but that was it."

The Editor for Native Max Magazine, Kelly Holmes, was also a coordinator for Thompson. She gave her advice on basic requirements for getting designers and models. "I appreciate [Kelly's] assistance in directing her," Diane said.

Thompson feels proud while wearing designer gowns, jewelry or OXDX T-shirts. Even today, she still has some Indigenous designers she would love to walk for. Thompson intends to enroll in college at Washington State University. "I am super proud of what she will do with her future," Yellowrobe said, "She has learned a lot from her project and what her sister Mikailah does to put on her basketball tournament in Denver, Colorado. It can be stressful, but one can never tell it is."





NPTEC and BPA Discuss Opportunities For Future Engagements



On Wednesday, April 24, 2019 the Nez Perce Tribal Executive Committee (NPTEC) had a government to government consultation with Bonneville Power Administration (BPA). Representatives were able to sit down and discuss a full agenda of items and participate in a tour of the Cherrylane Hatchery. "We have been looking forward to this meeting to continue building on the positive energy between Bonneville and the Tribe," stated Mainzer, Elliot Bonneville Power Administrator.

Recently, NPTEC and BPA were able to come to a mutual agreement that would benefit the salmon. Both parties were able to manage a partnership arranging for a flex spill operation. "In the last several months it was a critical turning point in the working relationship with Bonneville and the Tribe," Mainzer confirmed, "Our working relationships and our collaborations with our key partners; that is in many ways the heart of our strategy. That's the heart of our success."

During the meeting on Wednesday, Jay Hesse, Nez Perce Tribe Department of Fisheries Resource Management Research Division Manager, was able to show graphs that demonstrated



the impacts of the flex spill. There were some differences from what was expected but they will continue to monitor the process. It is too early to draw any conclusions from these current agreed that they would like statistics. In general, the outlook is positive, they are learning and continuing to make adjustments.

On the agenda, attendees also discussed outcomes potential for the Columbia River Systems Operations National Environmental Policy Act, the feasibility study for Dworshak, and the future of the Tribe's relationship with BPA. "There's an opportunity here for us and are about ankle deep now."

Lakewood, Colorado- The Sweet Water Athletics- Nez Perce (SWA) boys' basketball team traveled to the 34th annual Amerind All-West Native American Basketball Classic on April 5th - 7th. There were 52 high school boy's teams and 52 high school girl's teams, from every corner of Indian country. The directors of the United Native American Housing Association (UNAHA) region and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Office of Native American Programs (ONAP) in Denver, created the tournament to provide off-reservation incentives and educational opportunities. Students listened to motivational speakers, applied for college scholarships, and competed in 3-point and slam dunk contests.

The SWA team roster included Kendall Leighton, Payton Sobotta, and Titus Yearout from Lapwai, Idaho; Xavier Guillory from Spokane, Washington; Tru Allen and Simon Henry from Clarkston, Washington; and Trey Dreadfulwater from Grangeville, Idaho. The team is comprised of all cousins and one honorary cousin. Abe Yearout coached the SWA and Rosa Yearout served as "Team Grandma." Lapwai girl's high school players Aurelia Ellenwood and Glory Sobotta also played in the tournament with different teams.

The boy's team had a 2-1 record in pool play. They beat Cheyenne River Sioux Express, 71-35, lost a close game to Chief Boys, 68-67, and topped 1 Fam, 52-23. The top 26 teams were then seeded into the Gold Bracket, and the bottom 26 teams into the Silver Bracket. SWA was seeded #12 into the single-elimination Gold bracket.

They played their first single elimination bracket game at 10:00 p.m. on Saturday night against the Omaha Warriors, and won 59-46. This win advanced them in to Sunday play, they won their first two games playing, Team Wambli, 52-41 and Pine Ridge Sioux, 53-47. Reaching the Final Four in the

Gold bracket was a major feat given the large number of teams. Battling into the final minute, SWA boys came up short to the ND Icemen, 56-51 and tied for 3rd place. ND Icemen then lost to the champion team, Shades of Red. Sobotta also competed in the 3-point contest, and Guillory competed in the slam dunk contest. Guillory placed 2nd although he was the crowd favorite with his power, style, and variety of successful dunks.

Traveling to Denver was a fantastic experience for the Lapwai team, and their 5 fans. They were sponsored by the Sweetwater Athletics AAU charter and Gem Electric. Family and community support were also essential as they raised funds through a silent auction, baked food sale, and 50/50 drawings. Hopefully more Nez Perce Teams will be able to attend in the future and share in experience of some classic Native Basketball.

Kamiah HS to Host Native Voices

Kamiah High School Selected to Host Native Voices: Native Peoples' Concepts of Health and Illness Exhibition.

Kamiah High School has been selected in a competitive application process to host a traveling exhibition sponsored by the American Library Association and the U.S. National Library of Medicine.

Native Voices: Native Peoples' Concepts of Health and Illness explores the interconnectedness of wellness, illness and cultural life for Native Americans, Alaska Natives and Native Hawaiians. Stories drawn from both the past and present examine how health for Native People is tied to community, the land and spirit.

Through interviews, Native People describe the impact of epidemics, federal legislation, the loss of land, and the inhibition of culture on the health of Native individuals and communities today. Topics include: Native views of land, food, community, earth/ nature, and spirituality as they relate to Native health; the relationship between traditional healing and Western medicine in Native communities; economic and cultural issues that affect the health of Native communities; efforts by Native communities to improve health conditions; and the role of Native Americans in military service and healing support for returning Native veterans.

As one of 104 grant recipients selected for across the country, KHS Library will host the traveling exhibition for a six-week loan during its tour of the United States from May 1st to June 6th.

The public will have

opportunity to visit the exhibit on May 1st from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. and on May 13th during the school's culture fair from 3 to 6 p.m.

"I applied for this grant 4 years ago and was thrilled that our district was selected to host this amazing exhibit", said Colleen Olive, KSD Library Services Coordinator. "We hope the Native people, students, and our community will take pride in the exhibition and that all visitors will enjoy learning about these powerful concepts."

"We hope that visitors in communities across the country will learn from the ideas, practices, and traditions shared here," says Betsy L. Humphreys, acting director of the National Library of Medicine. "We hope, too, that those who host the exhibition will enrich it by including additional content and programs that reflect their local Native culture and history."

"This exhibition honors the Native tradition of oral history and establishes a unique collection of information," says Donald A.B. Lindberg, MD, director emeritus of the National Library of Medicine. "We hope visitors will find Native Voices both educational and inspirational, and we hope Native people will view it with pride."

Gaming Revenue Allocation Plan (GRAP)

Pursuant to Section IV(D)(1) of the Tribe's Gaming Revenue Allocation Plan (GRAP), tribal members who were eligible for, but did not receive the recent March 1, 2019 GRAP per capita distribution, are required to file a written request with the Enrollment Office within 120 days, which will be June 29, 2019. Otherwise, failing to make such request will means your entitlement to this year's distribution shall expire and the unclaimed funds will revert back to the Revenue Allocation Distribution Account for reallocation to all members at the time of the next distribution.

Members are solely responsible for keeping the Nez Perce Tribal Enrollment Office informed of their current addresses and any changes to the bank account that may have been set up to receive direct deposits of GRAP per capita payments.


